PUTTING OUR FAITH INTO PRACTICE

Reverend Father Aaron Warwick is priest in charge at St. Mary Orthodox Christian Church in Wichita, Kansas, where he has served since 2009. A graduate of St. Vladimir's Orthodox Theological Seminary in Crestwood, New York, Father Aaron and his wife, Gwen, have four young children: Emmelia, Adrian, Dominic and Simone.

"Then the righteous will answer Him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see You hungry and feed You, or thirsty and give You drink? When did

we see You a stranger and take You in, or naked and clothe You? Or when did we see You sick, or in prison, and come to You?' And the King will answer and say to them, 'Assuredly, I say to you, inasmuch as you did it to one of the least of these My brethren, you did it to Me'" (*Matthew* 25:37–40).

We Orthodox Christians hear these words every year before Great Lent on Judgment Sunday. The Church reminds us that at the judgment seat of Christ, He ultimately grades us not on how we make the sign of the Cross; not on whether we fulfill the letter of the law with our fasting; and not on how many divine

services we attended. Of course, we should do all of these things to the best of our ability. But they become meaningless ritual unless we put our faith into practice when we leave our church buildings.

I thank God IOCC helps us fulfill Christ's calling. Through our support of IOCC—be it financial or through service opportunities—we feed the hungry children of rural Kosovo, and families struggling economically in Greece. We provide water to the people of the

Holy Land, Uganda, and Tanzania. We help clothe Bosnians, supporting families and entrepreneurs through small loans. We visit the sick in Ethiopia, who endure unbearable yet preventable illness and disease. We provide shelter, emergency aid, psychological support, and education to people whose options have been restricted by the conflict in Syria. When natural disasters hit our own homeland, IOCC mobilizes to bring aid to our fellow Americans.

In the Judgment Sunday parable quoted above, Jesus invites us to serve anyone who finds themselves in need. He does not discriminate based on the person's faith or nationality. When a fellow human being—one also created in the image of God—suffers, we serve. IOCC aids people of all faiths and races.
