

FROM STRUGGLING STREET VENDORS TO VALUED SHOEMAKERS



Without the money to pay for an advanced education, Mesafent, 21, could only dream about attending college as he eked out a living shining shoes for a few dollars a day. Working in cooperation with the Ethiopian Orthodox Church-Development and Inter-Church Aid Commission (EOC-DICAC), IOCC recruited Mesafent and five other street vendors into a training program that took them off the streets and into a workshop making sturdy custom leather boots for thousands of impoverished Ethiopians

recovering from podoconiosis, a debilitating and disfiguring disease that affects the feet.

The current staff of six shoemakers, ages 21-35, cut, stitch and sole a dozen pairs of boots a day, and are earning enough to support themselves and their families. "I am twice blessed," says Mesafent. He explains that his new shoemaking skills not only help podoconiosis sufferers realize their dreams of pain-free walking, but also provides him with sufficient income to pursue his own dream of earning a college degree. Mesafent and co-worker Meneychel trim leather into custom-made boots. Through your support of IOCC, this shoemaker training provides much needed footwear to podoconiosis sufferers and much needed skills for these young men to earn a steady income.

IMMUNIZATIONS FOR GREECE'S MOST VULNERABLE CHILDREN

No shots, no school is the policy in Greece for school admittance. For unemployed and uninsured parents, the price tag for their children's immunizations may be too steep to pay, leaving young children out of school and in jeopardy of contracting serious illnesses. IOCC is providing immunizations for underprivileged children at a clinic in Thessaloniki. The series of immunizations will ensure that come fall, these children will join their friends at school to continue their learning. The immunizations are part of a larger response by IOCC to provide healthcare to vulnerable children and elderly in Greece.

BOSNIAN ENTREPRENEURS NURTURE POST-WAR PROSPERITY

Radinka's rented workshop hums with activity each morning as she and her employee, Jelena, cut and stitch leather and textiles into custom made belts, slippers and clothing. She's come a long way from selling handmade clothes from her cramped Banja Luka apartment, using her sewing skills to support a husband and two sons during the Bosnian War in the 1990s.

For the past ten years, IOCC has helped nurture the entrepreneurial spirit of more than 2,000 enterprising people like Radinka with loans averaging \$1,700 to help them grow their businesses and make a strong positive impact on the economy of Bosnia and Herzegovina.

The economic success of the loan recipients has translated into an impressive repayment rate of 97% and in turn, creates sustainability for IOCC's program to continue to offer new opportunities to entrepreneurs wishing to build businesses in agriculture, services, trade and small-scale production. Says the grateful entrepreneur, "IOCC was there for me and my family when there was no one else to turn to, and helped me create financial stability and security during the most critical period of my sons' lives, their childhood and the teenage period."



The three micro-loans Radinka received and repaid helped her buy new equipment and hire a worker to keep up with the growing demand for her custom handiwork.



GEORGIAN YOUTH TRADE TROUBLED PASTS FOR PROMISING FUTURES





Rehabilitation classes included team building exercises that helped them practice patience and develop skills to become more adaptable to change.

They came together sharing a common thread...92 young men and women on probation for troubled pasts filled with antisocial behavior, petty crime and substance abuse. Left on their own, young men like Levan, 20, seemed destined for a life outside the law. When he was selected to participate in a new rehabilitation project offered by IOCC in partnership with the Anti-Drug Center of the Patriarchate of Georgia, Levan saw it as a waste of time. "In the beginning I did not expect anything good at all, I saw distrust and

skepticism in almost every participant's eyes. I could not tell what I was doing here."

Antisocial behavior among young people is one of the biggest problems facing Georgian society today. The IOCC project included at-risk juveniles as well as young

probationers over 18 who were in more critical need of rehabilitation. During a month of intensive group counseling sessions with psychologists and a Georgian Orthodox priest, Levan and his fellow probationers learned new communication and coping skills needed to help transform their rebelliousness into constructive life skills. "I learned a lot here, and decided to become a successful man," said Levan. "I became more communicative, I saw that other probationers too are ordinary normal people. The rehabilitation really exceeded my expectations." For 23-year-old mom, Aleona, it inspired a new career path. "This training has really helped me. Now I want to become a psychologist myself."

St. Seraphim insists that other people are the joy of Heaven. Christ is Risen, my joy!

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
