United Way, International Red Cross, Catholic Charities, UNICEF, Lutheran World Services, etc. These are some of the best known humanitarian aid organizations that come to the minds of Orthodox faithful in America when they consider making a charitable contribution. And I ask, "why not IOCC?"

IOCC, established by SCOBA in 1992, has an international presence. It maximizes private donations tenfold by accessesing U.S. tax dollars and international funds (\$100M in 8 years!). It is acclaimed by governments and recognized by peer organizations for its professionalism, effectiveness and economic efficiency (10% administrative cost). It provides aid based exclusively on the needs of people. It has a dedicated Board of Directors and an outstanding staff. Most important, it is ours! It is an Orthodox organization, providing opportunity for Pan-Orthodox fellowship and ministry in America.

My personal goal is to make IOCC a household word in every Orthodox home in America. To do this, your help - the almost 2,000 Orthodox priests in parishes of all Orthodox jurisdictions throughout America - is needed. If the people are to become aware of IOCC and its sacred mission, it will be because of you! If IOCC is to be their chosen humanitarian aid charity, it will be because of the guidance they receive from you! If groups of Pan-Orthodox laity are to organize at the parish and city-wide levels in support of IOCC, it will be because of encouragement from you!

This is the inaugural issue of PRIEST TO PRIEST, my quarterly newsletter to fellow Orthodox priests. I will provide you with cogent updates; I will suggest ways to help with this sacred ministry at the parish level; I will invite your suggestions, questions and constructive criticism; I will ask for guest articles; I will ask you to consider the question, Why not IOCC? Together, we can make IOCC a household word in every Orthodox home in America!

Volunteers from an IOCC Metropolitan Committee will staff it; literature will be available; the IOCC video will play continuously on a "loop"; questions will be answered; names will be gathered of people who want to be kept informed.

With the support and encouragement of you, the parish priest, this can be done. Just think of the powerful impact on the lives of people in need worldwide if our parishes across the country latched onto this idea! One more way to make IOCC a household word in every Orthodox home in America!

#### **Volunteerism**

The long-awaited IOCC humanitarian aid program in the United States is scheduled to begin during 2000. In addition to responding to the needs of people here at home and providing more awareness of IOCC's work, the projects for the U.S. program will help instill a new, fresh paradigm among Orthodox Christians about volunteerism. # **The Support Grows**

There can be no doubt that the Orthodox faithful of America are increasingly supportive of IOCC and its ministry. More than \$10M in eight years from private donations (individuals, parishes, parish organizations, and others). These private donations are maximized as much as ten-fold, providing the funds required for services to people in need. The data for 1999 shows that about 22% of all Orthodox parishes and about 14% of all priests donated during the year to IOCC. Also, an increasing number of parish organizations (about 32% of those in our database) made donations. Obviously, there is plenty of potential for further growth. This is where the help of you, the local parish priest, is needed most. You can help us bring awareness to your parishioners about IOCC, you can encourage your parish leaders and organizations to become donors, and you can consider becoming a donor yourself.
