

"There are varieties of gifts, but the same Spirit. There are varieties of service, but the same Lord." (I Cor 12:4)



Recently, David Bryer, an Orthodox Christian and the former Director of the humanitarian aid organization Oxfam, addressed IOCC Board Members on IOCC's distinction as an Orthodox organization. He quoted Metropolitan EMILIANOS (Timiadis) of Calabria "that aid is not merely material but in solidarity, identifying with the suffering of others; that there is an intimate relationship between the sharing and offering of the Eucharist and of every act of Diakonia." Bryer described this as "the liturgy after the liturgy"; the continuation of all the inspiration of worship in the service of others.

IOCC is our liturgy after the liturgy. Committed to the ethos of our historic Orthodox Church, it seeks Orthodox Churches and local Orthodox organizations as partners in responding to those who are in need throughout the world. IOCC Expands Lebanon Assistance

IOCC is significantly expanding its ongoing work to help Lebanon recover from the war with a total of \$5.16 million in additional aid from the U.S. government. A grant of \$3.46 million has been awarded to IOCC by the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) for the repair and development of 154 public schools throughout the country. A \$1.7 million extension grant from the U.S. Government's Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance (OFDA) will expand IOCC's current program to help returnees rebuild their lives in southern Lebanon and southern Beirut.

Combatting Poverty in Georgia

A country with a renowned Christian heritage and unique culture, the country of Georgia has struggled economically and socially from the effects of the disintegration of the Soviet Union. At the invitation of ILIA II, Patriarch-Catholicos of Georgia, IOCC established its work there in 1994. Since then, school infrastructure rehabilitation has been one of IOCC's main activities. IOCC has also focused on underserved populations in the southern and western regions of the country with a micro-finance and credit program. Over 1,700 borrowers in Georgia have benefited from IOCC's program since 1999.



A Healthy And Safe Environment To Learn

"We used to not have windows or doors, but now we don't have anything to say except a big thank you to IOCC," says student Tekla Shonia (above, right). Most Georgian schools have not received major repairs, or even routine maintenance, for a decade or more. With funding from the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and Hellenic Aid of the Greek Ministry of Foreign Affairs, IOCC has repaired broken windows and doors, leaking roofs, and renovated bathrooms in 30 public schools.



A World of Education

Georgian school children in the village of Bia receive their World Atlases, part of IOCC's project to provide books and other school supplies to underserved children. Before IOCC's outreach to public schools in Georgia, there were very few resources in the country to fund public education. School buildings were often crumbling, teachers and administrators were paid little, and textbooks and school materials were in short supply.



An Iron-Clad Foundation


Vasil Antadze (above left), a welder in western Georgia, wanted his own business but did not have enough for the start-up capital, nor was he able to qualify for a bank loan. In 2002, Vasil received his first loan from IOCC, which he used to purchase an iron cutting machine. Over the next three years, Vasil received other loans from IOCC to purchase additional machinery and equipment and to employ other welders. One of the most rewarding aspects, says Vasil, of running his own business has been to provide employment for others. IOCC has provided loans to more than 1,700 borrowers in Georgia since 1999.

On the Frontline of AIDS in Ethiopia

A country with a storied Christian heritage, Ethiopia has struggled on several fronts, battling drought, war, famine and HIV/AIDs. IOCC began operations in Ethiopia in 2001 through a partnership with the Ethiopian Orthodox Church. Programs for the development of clean water sources and improved agricultural techniques helped rural communities overcome the effects of poverty and drought. In 2004, IOCC launched a comprehensive AIDs awareness and training program, with funding from USAID. Since then, nearly 7 million Ethiopians have received training in HIV/AIDs prevention. Children orphaned by AIDs and adults who are living with the disease are also assisted by IOCC through one-time start-up capital for small businesses.

Partnership in Ethiopia Constantine M. Triantafilou is welcomed by the Ethiopian Patriarch, Abune Paolus and president of Ethiopia, Girma Wolde-Giorgis. IOCC's partnership with the Ethiopian Orthodox Church and its humanitarian arm, DICAC, has resulted in nearly 7 million Ethiopians receiving training in HIV/AIDs prevention.





A Small Shop and A Lot of Dignity Though she had contracted the AIDs virus, Sufan Negash (right) was determined to become self-supporting. Through IOCC, Sufan, and eight other women with AIDs, received \$340 to open a convenience store in the rural town of Assela. Since then, four of the original nine women have died, but Sufan and the remaining four have kept on with their business, which provides Sufan with an income of about \$35 per week – a substantial sum for rural Ethiopia. IOCC has assisted over 8,000 Ethiopians who are living with HIV/AIDs.

Bicycles and A Bright Future

Tariku is a 17 year old orphan who lost both parents to HIV/AIDs. In 2004, he joined IOCC's program to support Ethiopia's orphans and was given monthly support for his food, clothing, and medical expenses. In 2005, IOCC's program shifted to more sustainable support and Tariku received money to start his own business. Tariku purchased a bicycle and began renting it to others. In less than six months he saved enough money to purchase three bicycles, which has doubled his income. Since 2005, IOCC has assisted 14,000 orphans in Ethiopia who have been affected by HIV/AIDs.
