Archbishop speaks at IOCC dinner

Greek Orthodox Archbishop Demetrios, Chairman of SCOBA, was the principal speaker at a dinner in Baltimore on April 18th marking the 10th Anniversary of IOCC. The event was preceded by a Pan Orthodox vespers service at the Annunciation Cathedral. In an inspiring speech, His Eminence described four conditions afflicting the modern world and how they are addressed by IOCC. "IOCC opened avenues for Orthodox activity where no one imagined we would ever go," he said. In summary, IOCC represents an Orthodox Christian response to a world increasingly filled with insecurity, need, alienation and despair. "We have responded to these challenges. May the Lord lead us into a beautiful, creative and amazing second decade of IOCC," he concluded.

Counseling service supports priests

The Orthodox Pastoral Emergency-Counseling Network (OPEN) being assembled by IOCC's U.S. Program supports clergymen with survivors of 9-11 victims in their parishes by making available to them volunteers from our communities with relevant training. In this disaster, professional counselors are needed to provide a safety net for people whose suffering may at some point exceed their ability to cope, and social service caseworkers are needed to help us define practical ways the survivors can be assisted. In one case we would like to emulate, when a parish priest learned that a 9-11 victim had gutted his house just prior to the tragedy, he organized his parish to finish the renovations so the family could move in. In the future, when parish priests and volunteers learn of ways to help, they can use OPEN to call on IOCC's staff and the entire Orthodox public. If we are to sustain our commitment over the emotional aftermath of the attacks — a period which will last many years — we will need to work together and in an organized manner, as OPEN encourages us to do.

IOCC staff and volunteer counselors support 17 SCOBAjurisdiction clergymen and we are working to support nine additional cases. We are extending our assistance to non-SCOBA Coptic Orthodox communities and are working to extend Orthodox philanthropy effectively to the general public.

Keep in mind that OPEN organized assistance for 9-11 victims AND lays the foundation for a national pan-Orthodox emergency response network. The first five of 25 Orthodox clergymen who will serve as the network's "regional coordinators" will train in May. Mr. Ajalat, along with former chairmen Andrew Athens of Chicago and John Rangos of Pittsburgh, were elected Honorary Board Members.

They join earlier interns in gaining first-hand experience in non-profit management and the operation of an international humanitarian aid organization.

IOCC PROGRAMS COUNTRY-BY-COUNTRY

A QUICK OVERVIEW - MAY 2002

What follows are selected highlights from among IOCC's projects in each country.

Bosnia and Herzegovina

Since 1997, IOCC has helped rebuild an estimated 500 homes damaged in the 1992-1995 war. That work, enabling refugees to return to their pre-war communities, continues. With support from the U.S. State Department's Bureau for Population, Refugees and Migration, IOCC's program supplies construction materials and teams of skilled workers to help returning families rebuild their homes - and their lives. The project provides a lasting solution for people who were displaced from their homes for as long as a decade.

Federal Republic of Yugoslavia

Encouraged by the success of last year's "Healthy Teeth-Beautiful Smile" project, IOCC expanded the dental hygiene campaign to eight schools (with a combined enrollment of more than 9,000 students) throughout Serbia. The project aims to improve both the oral health and the self-esteem of children who have lost hope after years of war. The project is made possible with the support of the Group 7 Vlade Divac Children's Foundation, founded by a group of Serbian professional basketball players. Children receive dental kits (toothbrushes, toothpaste and a zippered case), educational pamphlets and trading cards of their favorite basketball players.

Greece

Through the Greek affiliate of Medecins du Monde (Doctors of the World), IOCC is delivering much-needed medicine and medical supplies to hospitals in the West Bank. The doctors have accompanied IOCC personnel to the troubled areas of Jenin, Nablus and Ramallah in recent weeks,

responding to the urgent requests for assistance from hospital officials.

Jerusalem/West Bank

In response to the current crisis in the West Bank, IOCC has been delivering emergency food, medicine and hygiene parcels to Palestinian communities most affected by the violence. IOCC has committed \$270,000 in emergency funds toward the effort, with the support of the Greek Ministry of Foreign Affairs.



Lebanon

School teachers and administrators in Beirut are reporting a change in their students since the start of IOCC's school lunch and education program in October. Children now concentrate better in classes and do better in their lessons thanks to a program that gives them nutritional meals early in the day. Thus, the program encourages underprivileged students to stay in school and offers them the prospect of a better education.

Republic of Georgia

Many public schools in southern and western Georgia are in a state of disrepair. IOCC's infrastructure rehabilitation project provides matching grants and planning assistance to local communities who want to improve their schools. The program also facilitates small-scale rehabilitation of farm-to-market roads, irrigation systems and drinking water systems, thus ensuring the delivery of basic utilities and services to neglected communities.

Romania

IOCC has just received approval for a \$335,000 project that will tackle the problem of child abandonment in Romania. IOCC's program aims to reduce the likelihood of child abandonment and the number of children in institutions in three southwest Romanian counties. With its partner, the Romanian Orthodox Church, IOCC will work to identify and support at-risk families through a variety of community-based services.

Russian Federation

The condition of orphanages in Russia varies from region to region, depending on the local economy and the priorities of the local administration. In the poorer regions only 35 rubles a day (about \$1.20) is allocated per child. This amount must cover salaries, food, medicine and other expenses. IOCC's "Food for Progress" program gets food staples to orphanages, and other institutions, in nine regions in and around Moscow, enabling them to address other pressing needs.

United States of America

Two new classes are being added to IOCC's successful pilot English-as-a-Second-Language project in the Washington D.C. area, in preparation for a national campaign to expand social service and outreach programs on the part of Orthodox parishes.
