

Dear Fellow Laborers in the Lord's Vineyard:

I heard on the news this morning that the "Occupy Wall Street" movement has begun to erect tents in downtown Manhattan in anticipation of the rapidly approaching cold weather. Despite the warnings of the civil authorities not to do so, these protesters are sending the message that they are here for the long haul.

Recently an Orthodox priest and his wife were discussing this phenomenon with a small group of college-educated 20-somethings. One young man supported the protesters and asserted, "Well, after all, Jesus was a communist. In the Book of Acts it says that the earliest followers of Jesus held everything in common. Each one gave what he could, and everyone had what he needed." A young woman observed, "Jesus was always on the side of the poor, the weak, the sick and the vulnerable." There was general agreement that Jesus Himself may have inspired and supported the protesters.

The priest listened quietly, but he finally replied, "Is it not possible that we could equally say that Jesus was the ultimate oligarch? After all, He created everything in the first place, and He continues to be the Lord of all." That statement provided some food for thought, but it was really the priest's wife who made the most trenchant observation. She said, "Yes, Jesus owns everything, but He also shares everything, even His broken body and spilled blood." Silence.

At the end of every Divine Liturgy in our church the celebrant stands behind the ambon and prays, "Every good endowment and every perfect give is from above, coming down from the Father of Lights." (James 1:17) In this season of Thanksgiving and in anticipation of God's greatest gift – the Incarnation of His Only-Begotten Son – we would all do well to be Eucharistic, or full of thanks, for everything God does for us. Whether we are politically with the Tea Party or the 99 percenters, spiritually as Orthodox Christians we receive, we offer, and we share all of God's blessings.

ASSISTANCE EASES STRUGGLE FOR FAMILIES IN GAZA

Thousands of Palestinian families have been living in isolation since the 2000 closing of the Gaza Strip, struggling to survive without jobs, basic food items and adequate housing. Many of the men, like 34-year-old Hatem, work any odd jobs available but rarely bring in enough to feed, clothe and shelter their families. Hatem's ramshackle home in the Rafah district of Gaza has been pieced together with scraps of sheet metal, plastic and fencing to shield his wife and five children against the elements.

Responding to your desire to help those in need, International Orthodox Christian Charities (IOCC) through an award from the US Agency for International Development, implemented the distribution of aid packages to over 2,900 families in the Gaza Strip. The short-term aid packages distributed through IOCC's Winter Relief project provided families in need with vital food staples such as canned meat, rice, sugar, and tea as well as basic household necessities like laundry detergent, dish soap, towels, and pillows. Your ongoing support through IOCC, which has been providing assistance to the people of Gaza since 2005, is needed to continue our efforts to bring relief to isolated families living in this war torn region.
