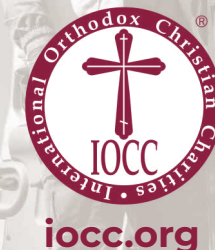

CONTINUITY AMID CRISIS

For people already facing crisis around the world, the pandemic that defined 2020 only complicated matters. This made IOCC's work all the more necessary. We took steps to keep the work going while keeping staff and the people we serve as safe as possible.



HONORING THE IMMEDIATE PAST CHAIRMAN

Mark D. Stavropoulos of Michigan served six years as chairman of IOCC's Board of Directors (2014-2020), the maximum permitted in the organization's charter. A long-time board member and past treasurer, as chairman, Stavropoulos led IOCC through response to far-reaching crises at home and abroad as IOCC found new ways to serve. We are grateful for his dedicated leadership.



PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS

When disaster strikes, the world needs an expert team that's ready for fast, effective emergency response.

With its established presence in **Lebanon**, IOCC moved quickly after the August 4 explosion. Immediate support included home visits, trauma counseling, emergency hygiene kits, and hot meals. Longer term, IOCC has worked with the Orthodox-run St. George University Hospital to help operations resume, while also repairing damaged homes, small businesses, schools, and more as Beirut rebuilds.



Across the **US**, emergency response continued with new safety protocols in place: across the Gulf Coast after Hurricanes Laura and Sally, in Tennessee after a tornado, and in Iowa following a derecho.



IOCC's digital **Care Calls** and **Care Compass** are adaptable resources for emotional and spiritual care in any crisis.

Developed in consultation with Orthodox clergy, licensed clinicians, counselors, and medical doctors, and under IOCC's **US Program**, the tools were created to fill a growing gap as COVID-19 took hold. Emotional and spiritual care—offered by specially trained volunteers called **Frontliners**—is part of IOCC's US disaster preparedness and response work. When pandemic safety concerns limited IOCC Frontliners' ability to do this work face to face, as they normally would, digitized tools allowed the work to continue and even scale up. Some ways IOCC serves (clockwise from above left): Helping small businesses thrive amid economic uncertainty in **Greece**, working with the Church in **Kosovo** to expand its agricultural and humanitarian reach, equipping communities and health workers in **Ethiopia** to combat the debilitating neglected disease pododiosis, and improving health among preschoolers in **Gaza**.

Vision and hearing screening is core to work in **Jordan**, ensuring people with impairments and disabilities receive accurate diagnoses and the glasses, hearing aids, or other devices they need.



To help stop the spread of COVID-19 in **Uganda**, IOCC donated equipment and supplies to hospitals, including personal protective equipment and other hygiene materials. IOCC also equipped Ugandan Orthodox parishes and trained leadership in prevention measures so services could resume safely.



A delivery of medical supplies to a partner in **Kenya** (top) is part of IOCC's gifts-in-kind program. In **Syria**, Dream Centers help children and families cope with the trauma of conflict (bottom right), and tablets for students in need in **Greece** helped IOCC-sponsored classes move smoothly online in 2020 (bottom left).
