Transforming Homes and Lives after Devastating Tornadoes

Crucial Grants Fuel Extensive Home Rebuilding in Kentucky Community

Beverly (not her real name, not pictured) is a resident of Marshall County, Kentucky. Now a widow, she and her husband often volunteered helping people affected by disasters across the US. After her husband's death, devastating tornadoes hit western Kentucky in late 2021, badly damaging the home where they'd lived together so long. Now she's one of the people that IOCC has helped as part of long-term recovery work in Marshall County.

While IOCC Frontliners visited the area soon after the disaster and provided emotional and spiritual care, a grant from the American Red Cross supported home rebuilding throughout 2023. IOCC teamsmade up of staff, trained team leads, and hundreds of dedicated volunteers—rebuilt 26 homes, provided \$430,000 worth of labor, and supplied materials like lumber, roofing, and windows. This is money that homeowners would otherwise have spent trying to get their life back on track.

When other organizations saw how this response was transforming the community, they came together to extend the program. With this funding, along with the dedication of volunteers, IOCC continues rebuilding in 2024. To be part of IOCC's mission serving people like Beverly, visit iocc.org/actionteams today.

A Group of Women Changing Lives in Lebanon

Promoting Maternal and Child Health through Education

In the Lebanese city of El Mina, where access to healthcare services and education is limited, a group of women have come together to create a support group dedicated to the health of expectant mothers and their children. Among them is Samia, a 32-year-old refugee, who has a compelling reason to help—she suffered a miscarriage due to a lack of support and reliable medical information.

Motivated by her own experience, Samia became a group leader for mothers in her neighborhood as part of an IOCC program. This initiative, funded by Diakonie ACT Austria and the Austrian Development Agency (ADA), trains women like Samia to teach mothers-to-be about the importance of prenatal vitamins, nutrition, and proper medical care.

Samia's first goal was to lead meetings that fostered a supportive environment. "Those sessions became a safe space for mothers to share their concerns, ask questions, and learn," she said.

Mona, one of the mothers in Samia's group, is grateful for the knowledge and support she has received. "I learned about the healthy diet of a pregnant woman and the variety of snacks she should eat to get adequate protein, carbohydrates, and different kinds of food," she said. "Taking the



Restoring and Renewing Kindergartens in Georgia

Creating Safe Learning Spaces

IOCC's humanitarian presence in the country of Georgia dates from 1994, with projects assisting thousands displaced by conflict. Work began with emergency response and has since grown to promote sustainable development for families and individuals in need.

Over the years, the Samegrelo-Zemo Svaneti region has accommodated hundreds of thousands of displaced people. Families often sheltered in hotels, unused buildings, and schools. In the city of Zugdidi, 13 out of 17 kindergarten buildings were converted to temporary housing.

One kindergarten in Zugdidi operated out of a rented house for years, without enough space or facilities for children to thrive. When local authorities began converting their school building back into classroom space, they lacked the funds to furnish it appropriately.

IOCC stepped in to fully furnish the space with benches, beds, cabinets, kitchen appliances, mattresses, linens, and computer equipment. Today, the kindergarten is fully functioning and can serve up to 150 children. IOCC also purchased and delivered kitchen appliances, dishes, and cutlery, plus computer equipment, for a second kindergarten in nearby Shamgona so that it's also ready to serve about 75 youngsters in that village.

The Zugdidi kindergarten is now open again, and IOCC continues working with local authorities to provide additional equipment in Shamgona, aiming to open this spring. In all, the program is creating a safe learning environment for over 225 students.
